John's Jots

f you try to point out something to a dog, the dog will often look at your finger instead of the object you are trying to point to. This is frustrating, but it illustrates a natural mistake we make from time to time.*
It is a mistake I see quite a bit in regard to Christmas.

We so easily get caught up in the traditions, activities, symbols and decorations of Christmas that we focus on them instead of what they point to—Christ. I have often heard people say, "Christmas just wouldn't be the same without..."—(you fill in the blank): a Christmas tree, Christmas lights and decorations, Christmas Carols, the Christmas parade, gifts, eggnog, going to a Christmas Eve service, etc.

Traditions and symbols are important, because they are a signpost, a reminder; they point to something deeper. But when we put too much emphasis on the symbols, traditions, and experiences, then we can lose sight of the deeper meaning and story to which they point.

God is all too familiar with our tendency for this. He calls it idolatry: worshipping something that is created rather than the Creator. We worship that which is most important to us – that which preoccupies us. God's chosen people got caught up in the trappings of religion and lost sight of God and the life He called them to. The festivals and rituals and even the laws became an end in themselves. That which was designed to draw them closer to God became a distraction and barrier to their relationship with God. They also got distracted by looking at the cultures around them and were drawn to their pagan practices and worldly ways.

Their story is our story.

During this Advent and Christmas season I encourage you to participate in all of the traditions and festivities that point to Christ (such as the ones mentioned in this newsletter). Enjoy the symbols and the decorations and the special treats. However, participate in these in the way that points to the true meaning of Christmas: the story of God becoming flesh and dwelling among us, the story of the birth of our Savior who offers abundant life here and now and through eternity.

Between the activities, take time to read the Christmas story from the gospels several times throughout the season. You may encounter the One at the center of all those celebrations.

Let us share this life-renewing, world-transforming message with all we come in contact with. Share in words, in songs, acts of kindness, and deeds of service. Let us invite others to Christ-centered festivities and away from other influences in the world. Let us proclaim and live out the themes of Advent – of Hope, Love, Joy, and Peace.
